MESSAGE FROM CO-FOUNDER/EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



It has been quite the year for Old School! When Claire and I began the Old School journey we quickly realized that this is the kind of work we were meant to do. We would spend hours talking about program possibilities and realized that we didn't know of any specific intergenerational arts organizations in the province. Through our thorough research, a continuation of training, and resume building, we became aware of similar work happening in other parts of the world. We now use them as models and resources to help build Old School into NL's first intergenerational arts organization and resource hub.

2020-2021 was a year of planning, growing, learning, and avoiding Covid-19. 2021-2022 became the year of movement and progress. We started our fiscal year with grants from the New Horizons for Seniors Program and the City of St. John's. This sparked lots of conversation in the media and the community about our plans for The Old School Bus and a new sensory show for people living with dementia. We began making connections with community groups that have shared interests and goals for the province, most notably Seniors NL.

We were able to share more about Old School at the Activation Stations that took place at the Pedestrian Mall during the summer months and we began workshopping with seniors to find out more about growing up in NL so we could create our sensory show. Our first go at the Reminiscence Project took place at Cambridge Estates and was a great success for the residents and students involved.

Christmastime we continued our Telephone Tunes Project from early in the pandemic with a variety of volunteer singers phoning seniors with a song to brighten their day. During this time, we secured our funding for the bus purchase from individual contributions, and the Scotiabank Impact Fund. City Wide then began working on making the bus road-ready. The delays from Covid-19 continued affecting the bus retrofit and the sensory show performances but we persevered, with the understanding of the NHFS Program.



After Christmas, we had our third year of Pen Pals with Leary's Brook Junior High grade six classes and three local seniors' residences. With some virtual meetings and in-person meetings at the end of their letter writing it was a very meaningful experience for all. In February, we were thrilled to be granted charitable status and ready to learn how things would change for us as an organization. Honestly, we are still learning; we are very grateful for the support from our Board of Directors and other community members, including Fred Earle, CPA.

As the end of the fiscal year came to a close we were so glad to receive more funding from the City of St. John's and from New Horizons for our Creative Communities Project in 2022-2023. We would like to thank everyone who supported us throughout the year, whether it was through a social media share or a monetary donation; every bit of support was noticed and appreciated.

This year would not have been at all possible without Co-Founder and Arts Programming Director, Claire Rouleau. She has been instrumental in every aspect of this organization and all of our projects. Her guidance, intelligence, oversight, and practicality helped me, personally, as a *new* Executive Director, to find what works best for the organization while keeping my two feet on the ground. As she begins her new journey as a mother, she has graciously offered to continue to help in any way she can. I feel beyond fortunate to have Claire as a friend and Old School partner.

As we proceed into another year of Old School, we look forward to what lies ahead. We will continue to run our projects to the best of our abilities, despite roadblocks that may appear. Most importantly we will continue our search for sustainable, core funding to allow Old School to be a *full-time* charitable group, allowing for more projects, partnerships, volunteers, training, internships, staff, community involvement, and wellness promotion.





1. BASIS OF ACCOUNTING
